The Christmas Crib

This time every year in schools, churches, homes, hospitals, hospices and shopping centres the Christmas Crib stands as a tangible reminder to us that God is real and God is with us. Cribs come in all shapes and sizes and often reflect the cultural context they are in. A crib is an important part of Christmas symbolism and a doorway to deeper reflection and prayer.

The formation of the first Christmas crib is attributed to St Francis of Assisi. In 1223, just three years before his death, Francis went to visit the Friars living in the remote mountain village of Greccio. St Bonaventure tells us that in order to excite the people of Greccio to celebrate the birth of the Saviour with all solemnity, Francis brought together all the elements of the stable in Bethlehem into what would become the very first Christmas crib.

Francis used real people, straw and animals to bring the Christmas story to life for the people of Greccio. People came from far and wide to see this spectacle. The night was aglow with candlelight as hymns were sung in praise of the God who is with us.

Francis was very real and very practical. He understood that as human beings we often need to see, hear and even smell something before it can enlighten our minds and ignite our hearts. As Francis carefully brought the characters of the Christmas scene together, he also skilfully brought the people of Greccio together; uniting them in prayer and praise around a living and breathing expression of God's connection with the human story. The crib remains a beacon of peace, hope and reconciliation and offers an opportunity for us to reflect upon the deeper message it represents.

Meet our Post Novices

Post-Novitiate is the stage of Capuchin formation that exists between a student friar professing temporary vows and making a life-long commitment to the Capuchin way of life by professing Solemn Vows. Currently we have four post-novice brothers living in the Capuchin Friary Raheny and involved in various apostolates.

Br Antony Kurian is originally from Kerala in India and before joining the Irish Capuchin Province worked as an Engineer on the LUAS project in Dublin. Antony is currently studying Philosophy at St Patrick's College

Maynooth and is involved in ministries both inside and outside the Friary. Br Ben Shore joined the Capuchins in New Zealand in 2008 and is currently spending a year of apostolic work here in Ireland. Br Ben is presently ministering to the homeless in the Capuchin Day Centre in Dublin. Last month we were delighted to welcome Brother Ade Green and Brother Jared Jamie back to Ireland. Both Ade and Jared completed their Novitiate in Kilkenny in September 2017 and have now returned to Raheny to for a post-novitiate pastoral experience. Br Ade is originally from Plymouth and is a member of the Capuchin Province of Great Britain, and Brother Jared comes to us all the way from the Custody of South Africa. We ask you to keep our student brothers in your prayers as they continue their ministry and study.

The Capuchin Day Centre for Homeless People

Smithfield and the old market areas of Dublin 7 have experienced somewhat of a regeneration in recent years and are fast becoming vibrant and cosmopolitan places. In the midst of this stands the Capuchin Day Centre for Homeless People.

The Capuchin Day Centre for Homeless People was founded in 1969 by Brother Kevin
Crowley OFM Cap and has operated for over forty years under the guiding principle that
'nobody should go hungry'. Over the years the Centre has evolved from a small lean-to at the side of the
Capuchin Friary in Church Street that provided soup and sandwiches to the men leaving the local homeless
hostels, into one of the primary centres for provision to homeless people in the country today.

Today the centre provides almost 1,000 meals each day, as well as over 1,500 food parcels each Wednesday morning. Over the last number of years the Centre has added a dentist surgery, optician, barbers and shower facilities in addition to the services of a Doctor, Nurse and Chiropodist. Besides providing food and medical services, the Centre often distributes essential clothing and footwear to the homeless who visit there. But beyond all of this the Capuchin Day Centre provides a safe place for people to come; a refuge in often dangerous and chaotic circumstances.

In recent times the Centre has seen a marked increase in the number of families and children using the services there. It has a dedicated family area and the children's Christmas Party is always a joyful occasion

whereby the children who come to the centre get to meet Santa and get a Christmas present. A simple yet powerful encounter that my otherwise be denied to them because of the circumstances they find themselves in.

Brother Kevin often reflects that without the generosity of the benefactors as well as the dedicated staff and many volunteers, the Centre just couldn't operate. It has always been the policy of the Day Centre that every cent donated is used to provide services directly to those most in need. Today, the annual running costs of the Centre have surpassed three million euro.


