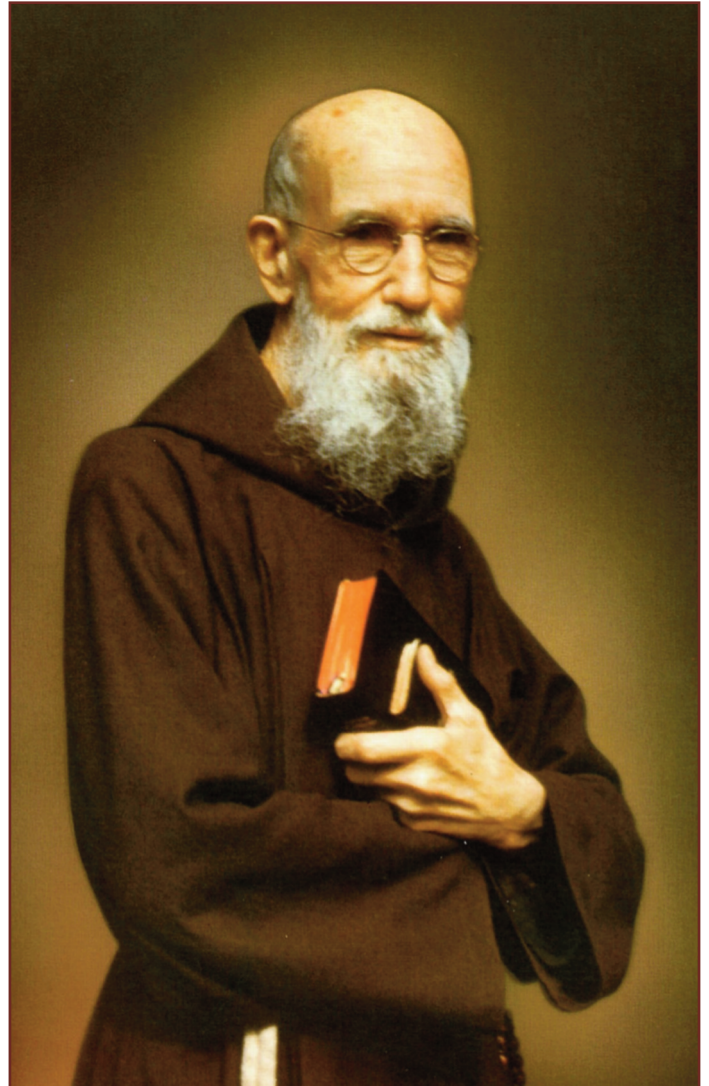
Welcome.

A warm Capuchin welcome to the Autumn edition of Capuchin Connection. In many ways Autumn is a particularly Capuchin time of year and not just because nature begins to turn multiple shades of brown!

During Autumn we celebrate the feasts of many of our great Franciscan Saints and Blesseds including Saint Pio and Saint Francis himself. This year we see Capuchin Priest Solanus Casey added to this illustrious list.

Solanus was born Bernard Francis Casey in Wisconsin on the 25th of November 1870. His Irish parents emigrated from Monaghan to the United States around the time of the famine. Solanus ministered for almost twenty-one years as a doorkeeper in Saint Bonaventure's Capuchin Friary in Detroit. The ministry of doorkeeper is a traditional Capuchin ministry of hospitality. Solanus greeted, welcomed and listened deeply to the people who called to the Friary door looking for both spiritual and temporal help. He was a highly sought after spiritual advisor and people queued around the block to meet and speak with him. He provided spiritual assistance and comfort to all who called to the Friary and was hailed locally as a saint long before he died on the 31st of July 1957.

He was a quiet and prayerful man who encouraged the people he met to 'thank God ahead of time'. Today he provides us with a great example of how faith, lived in trust, can positively impact upon and encourage others even in their darkest and most difficult moments. Solanus will be beatified on 18th of November at a Mass in Ford Field, Detroit.



Our *Friar in Focus* is Brother Edwin Flynn OFM Cap. Brother Edwin ministered as a Capuchin Missionary in Zambia for over fifty years and recently celebrated his 90th birthday. Friar in Focus: Brother Edwin Flynn OFM Cap

Hi, my name is Brother Edwin and I was born 1927. When I was asked to write this short article I asked myself 'why did I join the Capuchins 73 years ago?' The answer is that my uncle, Br Killian Flynn, was a Capuchin. He was ordained in 1931 and volunteered for the missions in Africa. Each week he wrote to his parents, my grandparents, and they would answer my questions about him and his life in Africa. Did he see any lions? "Yes, three of them, all together!" All I wanted was to go to Africa and see lions.

In my teens, the thought came up: "This can't be a real vocation – maybe it is just a childhood dream!" So for the next year I pictured myself as a school-teacher or a detective. But slowly only one calling surfaced in my mind and that was to follow my uncle's example and become a Capuchin.

St Francis would correct me, saying, "Wait a moment. You made a decision, but don't forget that it was the Lord who inspired you. Give thanks first to the Lord for his inspiration."

I went to Africa in 1953 to a country known today as Zambia. There I spent 55 years teaching Religious Education at Primary, Secondary and Teacher Training levels. It was always demanding but with God's help, I managed to cope with the challenges. My greatest joy was learning to relate to people of a different culture. I still rejoice and remember them as my friends.

Today I am still giving thanks to the Lord for the many times he inspired me in my life.



Fraternal visit from our Capuchin Brothers from Eastern Europe

This summer we were delighted to welcome some of our student brothers from Eastern Europe along with their Formator, Brother Jacek. Our brothers had just finished a year of pastoral studies and ministry in Krakow and were given an opportunity to experience what Capuchin life was like in another Province, and so they chose Ireland! Saint Michan's Parish, Halston Street, Dublin celebrates 200 years of worship

On the Feast of Saint Michan (25th August) Archbishop Diarmuid Martin celebrated Mass in St Michan's Parish, Halston Street, to mark the bicentenary of the parish. The Archbishop was joined for the celebration by Archdeacon David Pierpoint and Reverend Abigail Simes from the Church of Ireland, as well as many concelebrating priests and a packed congregation.



Two hundred years ago the building of a church in Halston was permitted however the agreement also stipulated that the church be built on a back street, hidden from the eyes of the ascendancy, and with no external symbols of Roman Catholicism.

The original church was extended, and the sanctuary and tower were built, in the 1890's and early 1900's. The Parish Priest worked closely with the Clarke Studios to create some fine stained glass windows. These windows along with the mosaics and plasterwork vibrantly tell the faith story of the local people.

All are most welcome to gather with us, and with Franciscans from far and wide for an evening of music and reflection as we celebrate Saint Francis' birth into eternal life.

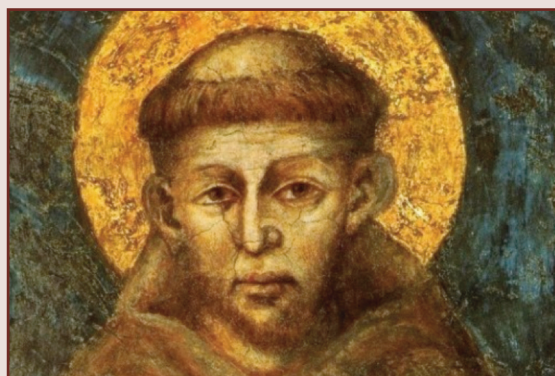
